To the Committee Members Evaluating the Excellence in University Service Nominations,

It is with great pleasure that I nominate Dr. Tina Holmes-Davis for the Excellence in University Service Award, as both I and my students have been the beneficiaries (on several occasions) of her leadership and selflessness in this important facet of our work as part of the academic community at Georgia College and the Department of Music.

Through her creation of the GC&SU Center for Music Education, Dr. Holmes-Davis has demonstrated a commitment to children and adults in need of greater exposure to the arts in our community, provided a means for my students to grow in their professional skills training, and has provided an avenue for the professional development of working professionals in Georgia and across the world.

Dr. Holmes-Davis' success in the area of service has positively and directly impacted my own efficacy in the area of service as a faculty member. Support from the Center for Music Education provides organizational leadership, student compliance training, instructional assistance, and timely, behind-the-scenes support for Bobcat Keys, an after school program I founded at GC&SU in 2019. This program busses ten students from Wilkinson County Elementary School to the Georgia College campus. My volunteer piano students teach these kids, one full semester of weekly group piano lessons, which culminates in a gala recital in Max Noah Recital Hall, on our Steinway concert grand piano. Her support has been instrumental (pardon the pun) and resulted in textbook purchases, funding safe and reliable transportation, assistance with multiple grant applications, communication with corporate sponsors, and even something so small (but so impactful) as getting Thunder to come and "high five" our students when they get their completion certificates at the final concert.

Bobcat Keys targets economically disadvantaged school districts, and a culturally diverse group of students who may not have access to piano lessons, or even a piano upon which to practice. These are the same students who could later be considered "at risk" of not pursuing higher education or specialized workforce training. Dr. Holmes Davis' support of Bobcat Keys, through the Center for Music Education, serves both a very real near-term and long-term positive outcome. I fully expect we will start seeing these students again as matriculating Georgia College Bobcats, and this is a sustained effort that has just completed its third iteration in five years.

I hope this letter has given the committee a personal insight into the contributions of an excellent faculty member and colleague. What I have written today is but one singular example—just the "tip of the iceberg" in terms of what Tina Holmes Davis continues to do, in service to her students, department, profession, and community.

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My service endeavors at Georgia College support and enhance my teaching effectiveness locally and within the larger music education profession. For example, I have headed innovative efforts to ensure our music education programs appeal to twenty-first century learners and to bring more music education opportunities to Middle Georgia. The following highlights illustrate my service efforts in relation to my teacher education responsibilities.

Service to the Institution

Music Department *Recruiting*

I am responsible for all recruiting events related to our state music education association (GMEA) such as the In-Service Conference, including the related Alumni Reception, and All-State events (instrumental and choral). Our visibility at these GMEA events sustains relationships with alumni and music educators across the state, which allow our current students to network in the professional community and attracts potential students to our programs.

Curriculum

In the last ten years, the music education committee, under my guidance, has reimagined and reformed our music education programs to meet the changing needs of our learners. In 2018, we moved the MME degree to online delivery, stabilizing enrollment without sacrificing rigor. Then we traded the five-year BME degree program for the more efficient BA+MAT path to initial teacher certification.

Committee

When I was hired, I was both undergraduate and graduate program coordinator. So, I naturally became the assessment coordinator for the music department. I now share assessment duties with an undergraduate BA coordinator, but we retain many of the strategies I developed. *Area of Specialty: Music Education*

Finally, I founded and direct the Center for Music Education at Georgia College (CME@GC), which is the public outreach arm for the music department. Though I am the CME@GCs sole worker, I depend greatly on program collaborations with other faculty. I support them with logistics, training, and local community connections, which in -turn facilitates their own efforts toward service goals. Some collaborative current and future programs include:

Bobcat Keys, by Dr. Owen Lovell, is an after-school program that provides free, weekly beginning piano instruction to students at Wilkinson County Elementary School.

Early Learning Center Violin. Our Suzuki-style strings program, by Dr. Bryan Hall, provides class violin instruction from GC string majors to pre-kindergarten students at the Early Learning Center of Baldwin County Schools.

Student Composition Competition, with Dr. David Johnson, through this program, we provide instruction, feedback, and evaluation for student composers.

*High School Jazz Jams is a partnership with Mr. Chris Enghauser and the GC jazz program. In it we include high school jazz musicians in an authentic jazz performance environment with GC students, faculty, alumni, and community musicians.

*The Song Writing Camp founded and run by Ms. Gabriel Banzon provides instruction and outlets for local student song writers.

*The Voice Camp, founded and run by Dr. Youngmi Kim, will provide voice and choir experiences to local high school students, providing opportunities that young singers can't always get at school.

College of Arts and Sciences and College of Education

My key responsibilities to the College of Arts and Sciences are as coordinator of music education programs and a graduate coordinator vetting and approving graduate curricular, program, and faculty actions. Additionally, I support the college in tenure and promotion committees, and various task forces as listed in my curriculum vita.

My efforts in music education closely align with the College of Education. So, I also contribute to various committees within the College of Education, such as Program Coordinators, Assessment, and the Educator Preparation Stakeholders Council.

Service to University

In addition to working as a graduate program coordinator at the university level, the GC Reads program allows me to plan and lead several literature review sessions each fall. MURACE and GC Journeys provide space for me to promote and supervise numerous graduate and undergraduate research projects. I also volunteered in 2021 as a disabled representative to the Senate's newly formed Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion Policy Committee.

Professional and Public Service

Guest Lecturer/ Presenter

I have spoken and presented widely on music education topics, such as differentiated instruction, and on my own experiences as a disabled musician after traumatic brain injury. Schools throughout Georgia hire me as a rehearsal technician.

Center for Music Education at Georgia College

Refer to the section on departmental service to see my collaborations in the CME@GC and the many new opportunities and experiences for middle Georgia and Georgia College students that come from each. These two initiatives are my own and represent my personal vision for the CME@GC.

Professional Development Workshop Series. In this core series, I bring free music-specific professional development opportunities to music teachers. Workshops are planned and delivered for application in local and national classrooms, as well as for certificate renewal, and annual teacher evaluation needs.

*Music Matters a disability music initiative planned for 2024-25 is a collaboration between the CME@GC, and the GC and Mercer University collegiate chapters of the National Association for Music Education (CNAFME) through which we will model and support the inclusion of disabled musicians in school bands and orchestras.

Collegiate Division of GMEA District XI

GMEA has a state level collegiate division but there are currently no college-specific district level opportunities. District XI (Middle Georgia) has persistent representation from Georgia College, Mercer University, and Middle Georgia State University, so I spearheaded a proposal, in progress, to create the first collegiate district-level division in GMEA right here in District XI.

Dear Provost Spirou,

I would like to support the nomination of Dr. Tina Holmes-Davis for Academic Affairs Excellence in University Service for 2024 at Georgia College and State University. As a tenured Associate Professor and member of the Georgia College Music Department since 2015, Dr. Holmes-Davis has provided outstanding service that is focused on a strong outreach component that serves the campus and the region, which represents the types of experiences we provide our students at Georgia College.

Dr. Holmes-Davis' service to the department, college and the university is uniquely centered around music education. She has served as the lead faculty member regarding our targeted recruiting initiative involving the Georgia Music Educators Association (GMEA) with their In-State Service Conference. Dr. Holmes-Davis has constructed our established physical and online presence over the past 5 years with exhibit booths staffed with faculty, students and related materials for the conference, All-State Chorus and Band and Orchestra weekends and, hosted a standing room only Alumni Luncheon reception. Her strong connection with GCSU as an alumnus (BM & BME 2000) and her historical and current knowledge of the Middle Georgia region as a band director has allowed us to develop a network to build upon for recruiting students as well as potential presenters and instructors for our program.

Her service with transforming our curriculum towards a more 21st century model has yield us some great results and areas we can enhance our profile. Dr. Holmes-Davis' educational background uniquely positioned the department to move our MME to online delivery which has successful increased our enrollment to a consistent 20-25 students over the past 3 years. Over the past ten years, she has lead the new BA+MAT path to teacher certification versus the previous BME which is proving to be efficient as well as lucrative for our BA students and those seeking a path to teacher certification. With the MAT and MME offered online as Fall 2018, our program has experienced a steady growth during the pandemic years of 2020-21 and has continued to grow in quantity and quality through Tina's stewardship as both the Undergraduate and Graduate Music Education Graduate Program Coordinator. She currently serves as the Graduate Music Education Program Coordinator after assisting another faculty taking the BA coordination due to growth.

The Center for Music Education (CME@GC) created by Dr. Tina Holmes Davis is now in its sixth year and has a mixture of scholarship and service components related to community-based music education activities. The Center has featured events such as the Bobcat Keys (2019, 2021, & 2023-GC piano studio collaboration with Wilkinson County Elementary school), Early Learning Center Violin (2022 to present with Baldwin County Schools) and the Student Composition Competition.

The Center has incorporated annual matinee concerts in collaboration with various GC ensembles, and free professional development workshops for Georgia music teachers which archived on the new launched website. Her duties for the Center are numerous from administration of the program, promoting and advertising the programming via social media and email blast, and securing clinicians/presenters as well as serving as a presenter. With recent formal recognition as a center on campus, Tina's vision for the Center of Music Education at Georgia College to provide community engagement opportunities aligns with the mission of our university, meets community needs, and provides recruiting opportunities for our music department.

Even with the many departmental related service initiatives and projects, Dr. Holmes-Davis has continued to offer additional service to the College of Arts and Sciences, the College of education, the university. In her role as graduate program coordinator, she oversees the graduate curriculum, faculty actions, graduate assistants and serves as a member of the education preparation stakeholders council for the College of Education. Each year Tina provide literature review sessions as part of the GC reads program for entering freshman. She has directed and supervised many undergraduate and graduate research projects as a part of the MURACE conference and GC Journeys. She is currently serving as the disability representative on the newly formed Senate Diversity Equity and Inclusion Policy Committee, which is an area very important to her based upon her personal experiences.

It is clear that Dr. Holmes-Davis is committed to service with related presentations and lecturers related to her own challenges as a disabled musician. Based upon my observations and interactions her service has provided a pathway for our faculty to interact with the community via their class setting and their professional expertise. Her unique ability to effectively communicate and collaborate with a variety of different stakeholders which has transformed our outreach beyond the middle Georgia Region. Her sensibilities and intuition have and continue serve the Music Department and GCSU as we develop new avenues of outreach such the *Music Matters* initiative planned for the 2024-25. This project will bring together the CME@GC, GCSU and Mercer University collegiate chapters of the National Association of Music Educators (CNAFME) to form a model to support the inclusion of disabled musicians in school bands and orchestras. She has turned her challenge into an opportunity to truly serve and have a long-term high impact on our campus and our community.

Based upon her evaluations since receiving promotion and tenure in Fall 2021, Tina's service is galvanized in support from a variety of music professionals at all levels and will have a lasting impact our students for the future. The music department and Georgia College and State University are fortunate to have one of its own graduates leading our efforts to connect our students to the real world. Without hesitation, I support Dr. Tina Holmes-Davis' nomination for Academic Affairs Excellence in University Service for 2024 at Georgia College and State University. Her application deserves the highest consideration.
