The hours for tours on Sunday are 2 pm, 3 pm, and 4 pm. The tour is free during the conference for conference registrants, but you'll need to show your conference nametag to get free admission. The form asks you to select your top 3 times and we will see what kind of response we get in the next month and readjust if needed. These tours are capped at 15 participants so sign up soon. The gift shop at Andalusia is open throughout the conference. Andalusia is located at 2628 N. Columbia St., a few miles north of the Georgia College main campus.

Barnes & Noble Bookstore, the GCSU campus bookstore, 135 W. Hancock St., has a collection of O'Connor-related books for sale during the conference. Drop by to check out what's available. They will be offering quite a few books by people presenting during this conference. And, of course, this is a great place to pick up a Georgia College t-shirt.

There's no tour available, and the house is not open to the public, but Georgia College now owns the **Cline Mansion**, 311 W. Greene St., the home where O'Connor lived while she was in high school and college in Milledgeville. Conference participants are allowed to walk onto the yard of the Cline Mansion via the driveway on Liberty St. and stroll about. The current plan is that after substantial restoration and renovation, this building will become the home for the Flannery O'Connor Institute for the Humanities.

Colin Cutler, creator of *Tarwater*, will be performing his O'Connor-inspired songs if a good venue can be found. There will likely be an admission fee.

Melanie DeVore and **Carol Bokros** will have on display in Heritage Hall an exhibit about the weeds that can be found at Andalusia. Imagine how O'Connor's Mrs. Cope would feel. The exhibit will be in Heritage Hall, near the check-in desk. There is an additional related exhibit to be found in the Natural History Museum in Herty Hall, on the corner of W. Montgomery and N. Wilkinson Streets. The Natural History Museum is free, open Monday through Friday from 8:30 am to 4:30 pm.

Marc Jolley of Mercer University Press will have a display table in Heritage Hall during the conference. Catch him to chat about the book you want to write for Mercer UP, the O'Connor books you might want to buy.

Sacred Heart Catholic Church, the church attended regularly by the O'Connors, is at 110 N. Jefferson St., just a few blocks east of campus on Hancock St. Here's the schedule for Mass during the Georgia College O'Connor conference:

There is also a **Catholic chapel at Campus Catholics** (211 W Greene St., across the street on the same side of Greene as the Cline Mansion), *and* it has Flannery O'Connor's kneeler. The chapel is open until dark. For more info, contact Charlotte Aexel, who will be happy to show you around, at charlotte.aexel@bobcats.gcsu.edu.

Memory Hill Cemetery, where Flannery O'Connor is buried with her parents, is at 300 W. Franklin St. Finding Flannery's grave: take Liberty Street (beside the Cline Mansion) to the south for a few blocks through the cemetery's main entrance. Head to the left and notice the short fence beside the taller fence along the front of the cemetery. Flannery's grave can be found where the short fence ends. There's a sign with the number 1 on it to mark this grave as well. Visiting the grave is best done in very small groups.

Up the road: 20 miles to the north of Milledgeville on Hwy. 441 is Eatonton, home of the **Georgia Writers Museum** at 109 S. Jefferson Ave. on the downtown square. Call 706-991-5119 for info. The Museum has exhibits on O'Connor as well as Alice Walker and Joel Chandler Harris, and there's Sylvia's Coffee Shop next door. The Museum is open Thurs.-Sat., 10 am-4 pm., and they can explain how to find the Alice Walker sites to the east of Eatonton.

What else? Check the internet for details about other local attractions: the **Old Governor's Mansion**, the **Sallie Ellis Davis House**, and, just a few miles south of downtown Milledgeville, **Central State Hospital**, once the world's second-largest asylum.

And visit the website for **Visit Milledgeville (visitmilledgeville.org**), formerly called the Convention and Visitors Bureau, for more ideas, including the famous **Trolley Tours** of downtown Milledgeville, which typically start at 10 am on Friday and Saturday, or of Central State Hospital at 11:30 on Saturday. You can call Visit Milledgeville at 478-452-4687 or 800-653-1804. The main office of Visit Milledgeville is at 200 W. Hancock St. There is a charge for these tours.
